

## From the Church Wardens



One of the joys of summer is the explosion of green everywhere, especially in the beautiful part of Sussex in which we are lucky enough to live. The vibrant green of the undergrowth in the woods, and the darker green of the canopy above, soft lush green of fields and verdant hedgerows and grassy verges studded with bright wild flowers.

The colour green strikes the eye in such a way as to require no adjustment whatever and is, therefore, restful. Being in the centre of the spectrum, it is the colour of balance - a more important concept than many people realise. When the world about us contains plenty of green, this indicates the presence of water, and little danger of famine, so we are reassured by green, on a primitive level.

In the cycle of the Church year, Green is also the colour we use to decorate our churches over the next three to four months. A long stretch of what is known, somewhat disparagingly, as "Ordinary Time". There is a sense of progression through

the Christian story in a pattern laid out millennia ago. It starts with the joy of Easter when Jesus rose from the tomb, followed by Ascension Day when He ascended to heaven, through Pentecost when the promise to send the Holy Spirit was fulfilled and culminating on Trinity Sunday when we celebrate knowing "one God in three persons".

Then we arrive in early summer, amid all the green that surrounds us for a period of quieter, more relaxing and more reflective time. In these summer months of "Ordinary Time" - meaning normal or natural time, not humdrum - we can all quietly, restfully grow in our lives with our families, with nature and with God. As such, this time is invaluable to our well-being physical, mental and spiritual.

So as we appreciate our verdant countryside, we can relax, regain our balance and grow. Long summer days and balmy starry nights - perfect for relaxation and growth. Whether you go away on holiday, or enjoy "Ordinary Time" at home,

We wish you a restful and restorative summer.

#### St Alban's Church floor

The cross aisle carpet was removed from St Albans Church in June revealing a flagstone floor and a number of black marble tombstones from the earlier Medieval Church which early maps suggest was in the same position as the current building; the original Church having been destroyed by fire. It is quite possible that this floor with its tombstones is a survivor from that earlier Church.

The cross aisle carpet was the one you stepped on as you entered via the south porch door and traversed the Church to the north door via the stone font. It was removed not only because it was looking rather tired but, more importantly, it was laid on rubber underlay which is inappropriate for stone buildings as it prevents moisture evaporating from the floor. The removal of the underlay had been a Priority A action in the 'Summary of Works Requiring Attention' in the last Quinquennial Inspection Report published in December 2016. The burgandy coloured central aisle carpet on the other hand is laid on fibre which

is a satisfactory underlay for historic buildings such as St Albans, and though there are no plans to remove this it would be interesting to see what lies underneath. —David Torr

#### **News from the Pews**

During the past two months our Safeguarding Officer, Roy Buchanan, has been working hard to make sure that all 34 church members who hold office or are in any way involved with children or vulnerable adults have completed the required level of Safeguarding training. This is a time consuming exercise, but necessary if we are to be a truly safe church.

At the end of May, about 40 people attended our annual 'Service on the farm' to celebrate Rogation Sunday, the day on which we ask for God's blessing on the sowing and planting. At the kind invitation of Susanna and Douglas Jacobson, the service this year was held in a field at their vineyard in Eridge (aboove). Imtiaz Trask who lead the service gave us a reminder of how important it is that we all give each other

a hand. "Together we are strong".

After the service Douglas took a group for a tour of the vineyard, then some of us ate our picnic lunch in the sun, enjoying the view over meadows and vines.

In May we were delighted to welcome a new volunteer to the churchyard team. This small but loyal band give their time to keep the churchyard mown, swept and tidy for everyone to enjoy, and we thank them for their commitment.

The window which was badly damaged when the church was broken into in May 2018 has now been restored and repaired. It is a wonderful example of the work of a gifted and skilled craftsman.

We are now in the season of weddings. In June, Georgina Doherty and Matthew Hawkins were married in St Albans, the first of 5 weddings due to take place in our church this summer.

While we're very much looking forward to the Martin family moving into the Rectory in August, we continue to rely on and are very grateful to Ministers who come from near and far in the Diocese to take services for us.

#### **Parish Past**

In the mid 1450's Henry VI was on the throne - a gentle impractical dreamer. Consequently national politics and finances were in a disastrous muddle. Yorkists and Lancastrians were at each other's throats and the king's generosity to his favourites, also his general incompetence, meant that his government was deeply unpopular.

Normandy had been lost to the French and national debts amounted to some £400,000 at a time when the royal income was around £5,000. The royal court alone cost approximately £24,000 a year and tax demands were incessant. Discontent eventually exploded in this area under a local man called Jack Cade (pictured below) who, announcing himself as 'Captain of Kent' led some 40,000 followers to London.

There, under the promise of good behaviour, the largely sympathetic Londoners allowed them to camp at Southwark without a fight. The generally held, if mistaken, belief seemed to be that if only they could reach the king personally he would understand their grievances, all would be put right and his corrupt councillors dismissed.

Our local interest is that three Frant villagers were in Cade's army: once the rebellion collapsed pardons were

issued to the less important rebels, among them we find William Apps, Robert Langley and William Bodyll of Ferenth, then the name for Frant. Apps was very much a local name and there is some evidence but no proof that he was landlord of the Bull Inn, the Abergavenny as it now is. So perhaps we can imagine the three arguing and full of rage at injustice in the taproom before departing in beer-fuelled bravado to join the uprising. Ultimately Cade proved unable to control his men, they became drunken looters and the Londoners turned against them. A battle followed on London Bridge and, defeated, the dispirited survivors tramped home, further divided by that limited promise of a pardon.

The Frant men obviously survived, since they were specifically pardoned, and they are recorded as carrying out some mildly dubious land deals in later vears. So no doubt reminiscences of their London excitements continued to be heard in the bar as long as they lived, perhaps suitably embroidered as time went on. Cade himself was hunted down and killed allegedly "in a garden" near Heathfield but exactly where is speculative, although a later monument to him still exists as does a Cade Street. -PatWright

#### **Parish Council News**

On Thursday 23rd May the Parish Council held its Annual Parish Meeting in the Memorial Hall. The Annual Meeting is an opportunity for the Parish Council to update residents on what has been going on across our patch and to talk about plans for the future. William Rutherford was recently re-elected as Chairman of the Parish Council, but unfortunately was out of the country for the Annual Meeting, so the deputy Chairman, Stuart Crookshank presented a report on the year, highlighting particularly the work on green spaces.

The Parish Council has worked closely with the Friends of Frant Green Spaces to improve the diversity of habitat on the Green in Frant and is now looking to tackle the problem of erosion caused principally by traffic. Jan Steadman explained the importance of the habitat in her presentation to the meeting about the Friend of Frant Green Spaces, and that the group hoped to receive a grant for planting a native hedgerow about the parish field. She also highlighted the

erosion issue, suggesting that the Green could be looking up to 1 foot a year in some places.

The last year has also seen the recommissioning of the football pitch and the creation of wildflower bunds in Bells Yew Green. Thanks to the generosity of the Abergavenny Estate the plans for a recreational Green in Eridge are progressing well, and it is hoped that the Eridge Memorial Green will be inaugurated in 2020.

The Parish Council has also used some of the charitable funds it receives from the Henry Smith Foundation to help finance a youth worker at St Albans, Ed Pascoe. Ed gave a presentation to the Parish Meeting about his work, including the Little Fishes Mum and Toddler Group, the Sunday Club and an after-school club in the Stables. Ed has amazing energy and is already has a series of new initiatives in the pipeline, including a Scandinavian styled forest school with open air activities and community engagement activities such as litter picks.

Brian Gill gave a brief talk about the work of the Parish Friendship Group, which works to combat loneliness and isolation in the community. The Group organises theatre outings, Christmas shopping trips and in June a trip to Bexhill with afternoon tea. The Group are supported by a small number of volunteers, but are always happy to welcome anyone willing to give up a little time to help.




# Local Talent » Kirsten van Schreven



#### News from our MP, Nus Ghani » The Sparkling Jewel in the South East's Crown

My Husband and I recently celebrated our wedding anniversary in Tunbridge Wells. Eating at The Warren (above), we drank sparkling wine from the Bluebell Vineyard in East Sussex (right), and ate wonderful, local produce from The Warren's Crowborough Estate.

We didn't have to travel many miles for that meal, and neither did our food and drink. But, we were surrounded by people who had made some very long journeys indeed. The South East is gaining a global reputation for the quality of its still and sparkling wines, and for the hospitality industry surrounding it.

This reputation is rightly deserved, and with English Wine Week having just been and gone, it's important to reflect on how far this sector, which is a major employer in Wealden, has come.

Over the last decade or so, it has been incredibly exciting to hear more and more stories of English wines beating their continental and global competitors in blind taste tests.

This success has lead to a boom for the sectors, with more and more vineyards starting up.

A record number of English wine companies were launched in 2016. Sixtyfour new wine businesses put down roots in England and Wales, up 73 per cent on the previous year.

UK producers now produce upwards of 5 million bottles a year, and leading


